**Nature: Clever Monkeys** airs 11/9 at 8 p.m. and 11:30 p.m., and 11/11 at 10 a.m. Love, language, guilt, envy, generosity, secrets, lies and sophisticated society are not unique to humans. We share those complex traits with our relatives — the monkeys. Following along as the babies of two different species are reared, viewers learn how and what monkeys teach their young. Monkeys around the world rely on that knowledge to adapt to the remarkable variety of environments they now call home. Who are the cleverest monkeys? And how much of human experience do they really share?

**Austin City Limits: Aimee Mann/Iron & Wine** airs 11/15 at 9 p.m., 11/16 at 4 p.m., and 11/20 at 2 p.m. Singer/songwriter Aimee Mann debuts on the Austin City Limits stage with tunes from her latest album @#%&\*! Smilers. Folk rockers Iron & Wine, showcasing their acclaimed *The Shepherd's Dog* CD, follow. Austin City Limits continues its longstanding tradition of showcasing the best of original American music. Musical styles range from contemporary and traditional pop to rock, country, blues, bluegrass, Latin, folk, roots and more.

**The Rape of Europa** airs 11/24 at 9 p.m., 11/26 at 11 a.m., and 11/30 at 9 p.m. This program relates how Europe's art treasures survived the systematic theft and deliberate destruction perpetrated by Germany's Third Reich during World War II. For 12 years, the Nazis looted and destroyed art on a scale unprecedented in history, but heroic young art historians and curators from America and Europe fought to rescue and return millions of lost, hidden and stolen treasures. The legacy of this tragic time in history continues to play out today as families recover looted works of art and nations fight over the ill-gotten spoils of war. Joan Allen narrates.

## CREATE/THINKBRIGHT (CABLE 433/DT 21.3)

This month features Native American heritage month programs.

**Brulé' and AIRO - Live from Mt. Rushmore: Concert for Reconciliation of the Cultures** airs 11/4 at 9 p.m. This past July, Brulé' performed to over 11,000 people at Mt. Rushmore. Brulé' and his band, AIRO (American Indian Rock Opera), have become one of the top-selling Native American recording groups with more than a million CDs sold worldwide. Current band members include: Paul LaRoche on keyboards, Nicole LaRoche (Paul's daughter) on flute, Shane LaRoche (Paul's son) on guitars, Moses Brings Plenty and Clay Bryan on traditional drums and percussion. Paul, Nicole, and Shane are enrolled members of the Lower Brulé Sioux Tribe of South Dakota; Moses is a member of Oglala Sioux Nation from Pine Ridge; and Clay Bryan is from the Rosebud Sioux Reservation.

**Gallery: The National Museum of the American Indian** airs 11/16 at 11 p.m. This program charts the unveiling and dedication of the first Smithsonian museum dedicated exclusively to American Indians. The grand opening of the National Museum of the American Indian coincided with the six-day, outdoor First American Festival and the Native Nations Festival. The colorful opening day began with a Native Nations Procession, the largest gathering of Native peoples in modern history. More than 25,000 American Indians, representing more than 500 tribes and Native communities — from as far north as Alaska to as far south as Chile — participated in this historic event.

**Oceti Sakowin: The People of the Seven Council Fires** airs 11/26 at 10 p.m. For six-hundred years we have lived under the misconception that Columbus discovered America. What he did was stumble on a land already occupied by many people and many nations. In the center of that land were a people who call themselves Oyate: "the People". This is their story, in their words. Original music composed and performed by well-know American Indian artist, Lakota dancer and indigenous flute player, Kevin Locke, reared on the Standing Rock Sioux Reservation in South Dakota.

## PBS World September Highlights (DTV-21.2, Time Warner Digital 524)

**America at a Crossroads presents *Dissonance and Harmony: Arabic Music Goes West*** airing 11/5 at 8 a.m., 2 p.m., and 7 p.m. and 11/9 at Noon. This program offers new imagery of Arabs, not as patently anti-American, not as terrorists, but as artists, universally familiar in their struggle to share their talent and ideas. The film follows an eclectic mix of Middle Eastern musicians from their own very specific turf in the Middle East to the United States. Once there, in Los Angeles, they collaborate with other gifted musicians from the West, finding common ground between two cultures in conflict.

**NOVA: Alien from Earth** airs 11/13 at 9 a.m., 3 p.m., and 8 p.m. and 11/15 at 7 a.m., 1 p.m., and 7 p.m. NOVA presents exclusive coverage of new excavations that were undertaken in the summer of 2007 at the site of Ling Bua on the island of Flores, Indonesia. These are the first investigations of the cave site since the sensational discovery of tiny and bizarre human fossil bones at the site in 2004. NOVA investigates the furious scientific debate currently raging on what "Hobbit" bones represent. Are they fossils of a previously unknown primitive branch of the human family? Or are they remains of a dwarf race of modern humans suffering from a strange pathological condition?

**Independent Lens: Lioness** airs 11/19 at 9 a.m., 3 p.m., 6 p.m., and 8:30 p.m. and 11/23 at Noon. How did five female Army support soldiers — mechanics, supply clerks and engineers — end up fighting alongside the Marines in some of the bloodiest counterinsurgency battles of the Iraq War? This program give viewers an intimate look at war through the eyes of the first women in U.S. history sent into direct ground combat, despite a policy that bans them from doing so. Through harrowing personal stories, these women candidly share their experiences in Iraq as well as experiences from their lives back home to form a portrait of the emotional and psychological effects of war.
