### Read to Your Bunny

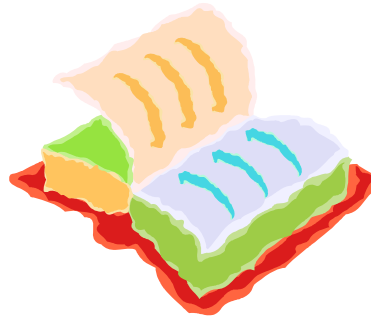

This rhyming story serves as an invitation for parents and children to read together every day.

#### Things to Talk About:

**Reading can be fun:** When children encounter difficulty with reading, reading can become a chore. By starting early and helping your child have positive experiences with print, you can avoid this. Here are some things you can do to make reading more fun:

- When reading aloud to your child, give the characters different voices to add variety.
- After finishing a story, act out the parts of the story with your child.
- Wear pajamas, wrap yourselves up in blankets, or read under the covers with a flashlight once in a while



#### Activities to Do:

##### 1. Set aside 20 minutes.

**You Will Need:** a comfortable place to curl up with your child, a quality children's book, twenty minutes of uninterrupted time each day

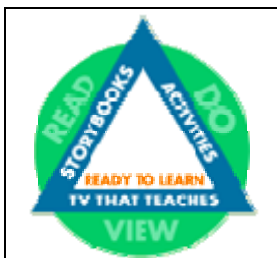
**What to Do:** Ask your child to choose one book, or several books for your shared reading experience. Designate a comfortable spot where you and your child can curl up and read together for at least twenty minutes each day. Read aloud to your child. Have your child take a picture walk and tell you what is happening in each picture.

##### 2. Decorative Rabbit

**You Will Need:** 1 large white paper plate, 1 small white paper plate, white construction paper, markers, crayons, scissors, glue or tape, cotton balls, pipe cleaners

**What to Do:** Help your child securely attach the small paper plate to the top of the large paper plate using tape or glue. (The large paper plate will serve as the bunny's body and the small paper plate will serve as the bunny's head.) Help your child cut out and attach two oval shaped ears and two small paws. Using crayons and markers, your child can decorate the bunny's face. Pipe cleaners can be used for whiskers and the cotton balls can be added to make a tail.

As you and your child finish a book, write the title of the book on the decorative Bunny's tummy. Soon you'll have a list of completed books that your child can proudly point out to family, friends, and visitors.
