Asian American, Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander Heritage Month

In 1978, the U.S. Congress passed a joint proclamation declaring the first week in May as "Asian/Pacific American Heritage Week." Presidents continued to issue annual proclamations until 1992, when Congress passed and Pres. George H.W. Bush signed Public Law 102-450 that annually designated May as the month to celebrate the contributions of Asian and Pacific Americans to the country.

The month of May was chosen to commemorate the first Japanese immigrants to the U.S. on May 7, 1843, and Golden Spike Day on May 10, 1869.

Golden Spike Day marks the completion of the first transcontinental railroad lines at Promontory Summit, Utah cover 1,776 miles. here railroad dignitaries joined the eastern and western sections of the railroad with a golden spike. More than 13,000 of the 15,000 hired laborers were Chinese immigrants.
